Nursery – The Hive

In The Hive, we've been learning all about healthy choices to look after our bodies! We know that eating healthy foods like fruits, vegetables, and dairy helps keep our teeth strong, while sugary snacks can cause toothaches. We've been practising our phonics every day, making sounds with letters like "b" for banana and "t" for tomato, and blending them together. Rhyming has been so much fun too, with words like "cat" and "hat" or "pig" and "wig"! It helps us become better at reading and writing. We also know that staying active helps us stay healthy. We love running, balancing, and playing in the sand and water. We've been ambitious in our outdoor play, improving our gross motor skills with digging, building, and exploring.

Hatching, Growing, Changing!

We've been reading lots of exciting books in The Hive! In Dora's Eggs, we learned how baby animals sometimes don't look like their mummies at all. In Monkey Puzzle, we discovered how the little monkey looks for its mummy. We also read The Very Hungry Caterpillar, and watched how a tiny caterpillar turns into a beautiful butterfly. We've been practising our phonics while reading these books, making the sounds of words like "b" for butterfly and "c" for caterpillar. We've even learned to Makaton sign the story! Along with these books, we've read lots of information books about healthy choices to help us make smart, strong, and safe decisions.

And, of course, we had a fantastic visit from Evil Pea and Super Tato—causing a bit of mischief in The Hive! Evil Pea tried to cause trouble, but Super Tato was there to save the day! It was a reminder that we need to stay safe, make good choices, and be respectful of others. At The Hive, we celebrate inclusivity, understanding that everyone grows and learns in their own special way.















The Early Years


Reception

This half term we have been thinking about Homes and Houses, including those of the animal kind! The Reception pupils have listened to many lovely stories along this theme and have shown a great interest in where people live, and the difference between homes and the places that they are in. Their favourite read has been Town Mouse, Country Mouse. The children have learnt to use the words village, town or city to describe places. As the term has progressed, the children have been increasingly interested in the natural world. They have learnt why some animals must live in the wild, and why some animals can be kept as pets! We are currently waiting for some eggs to hatch, so we can see chicks leave their egg home!!
















KS1 Year 1 and 2

In KS1 we have been embracing the outdoors this half term! We have been doing lots of weather reporting - measuring the wind, temperature and rain then we have used our information to start predicting the weather! We've built microhabitats in our outdoor area and have been observing who has moved, ensuring they have everything they need to make it a suitable home! On these recent sunny days we have even been reading our class book 'Alien Adventure' outside which has been a lovely change and the children are really enjoying our class chapter books! We are also loving TTRS, children have their log ins in their reading records, it's amazing to see how much they are playing at home









YEAR 3

Year 3 have loved our texts this half term. We have campaigned for equal rights by looking at "Fantastically Great Women Who Changed The World". We then discovered a top secret book "How to Live Forever", and created such amazing mystery stories that it gave us goosebumps! In maths, we have made an amazing start in our fraction work, an area of maths that is so important as they progress through KS2.

In the afternoons, as geographers we have loved learning about Shakleton, and plotting our own journey around school, using the eight-points of the compass. In our science lessons, we have been scientists by investigating conductors and insulators, all the time thinking about electrical safety. A real highlight to our term was our visit from Murton Park, who led us on an interactive Anglo-Saxon day. This really deepened our pupils' understanding of this complex time in British history.

YEAR 4

Well, Spring has flown by! Year 4 have read another novel called 'The Miraculous Journey of Edward Tulane', where there were emotional cliff hangers and turmoil to work through. From this novel, they wrote a newspaper report to share the tale of Edward Tulane. Using visual prompts, the children have progressed in their writing of character descriptions. The understanding of a description not only being the looks of a character, but also its feeling and actions to create an all-round understanding of them; What an improvement in skills from January to April. Recently we have read our second picture book 'The Barnabus Project', from this they gained so much knowledge of the character from the detail within the pictures – the excitement in the room each time the page turned was a delight to see (and feel).

Maths has continued to develop, this time with multiplication, division, area and perimeter, and currently onto fractions. The use of numicon has helped to visually understand the mathematical concepts, especially when moving from fractions, to mixed numbers (wholes and fractions) to order fractions and finally improper fractions (once upon a time called top heavy fractions). They have all 'upped their game' with times tables; having internal tournaments of girls V boys was the best incentive to get them going. The pace of recall is reducing each week and seeing their confidence growing is what we're doing it all for.

For DEAL (Drop Everything And Listen), we have been reading the first novel of 'A series of Unfortunate Events' and WOW what a book it is. Hearing 'Ooohhh' and 'Noooo!', then gasps of realisations has had me excited to read the book to them. Many have now shown an interest in the series, some finding it on TV and other searching the library for book 2. This is what reading is about. Each week, Mrs Wall comes to tell me about Year 4 in the library, and how they are the most enthusiastic class to come to share their book with her, find a new one, and then come back the following week with excitement to do it all again. Thank you to you all for helping this happen, the daily reading is fantastic and I can now see how being a reader is supporting them being a writer

Year 5

Year 5 have had a very busy half term! In our English, we have been reading the book 'Breadwinner'. We have used this to write a persuasive letter from one of the characters. We have also looked at the book, 'Varmints', which we used to inspire some beautiful setting descriptions and draw some fantastic pictures. We have also enjoyed two different DEAL books, 'The boy at the back of the class' and 'The soup movement', both of which the class have loved!

In maths, we have spent a lot of time learning how to multiply and divide and have completed lots of work around decimals. We have also started looking at shape, and how to calculate area and perimeter. They have worked so hard through all of these units!

In the afternoons, Year 4 and 5 have also been busy. In Geography, we have been looking at Antartica, where we looked at Shackleton's expedition. The children loved learning about what his team did while they were there and how they got home. In History, we have been looking at the Anglo-Saxons. We finished this learning with a fantastic visit from Murton Park, where we looked at some artifacts and did some activities around this. This was really enjoyed by everyone and really enhanced their learning. In RE, we have been learning about Hinduism and what is important to their religion.

Year 6

Year 6 have again had an incredibly busy term with a key focus being upon their SATs – which are fast approaching! They have shown great resilience within their learning and revision. They have demonstrated a readiness and organisation for Year 7 by completing weekly homework – some often with additional practice from Mrs Kennedy, Mrs Kirkman or Mrs Kaufman Aside from their maths, reading and writing, they have looked at the circulatory system within science – delving deep into the heart of the subject! Having learnt about blood, they have been able to explain what blood is, what its purpose is and what it is made up of. Not for the squeamish! Building upon this knowledge has helped them in learning about the heart: knowing the chambers, the purpose and how it functions within the human body.

PE, during the second half of spring term, has focused upon dance using Fleur East's "Sax" track to learn street dance moves known as 'tutting'. In groups, they have learnt a routine using beats of 8 and found ways to adapt the choreography to include sections of movement of their own – all with great results! They have all got some nifty moves!

Earlier in the term, the class stepped back in time to World War Two and researched into the beginnings of the war and shone a real spotlight upon children of the war and what evacuation was like. Making gas mask boxes and then experiencing an air raid siren during their lesson meant they were evacuated to their black out shelters in the hall where they experienced the sights and sounds of the blitz. It highlighted to many in the class the rush of emotions that children back then must have experienced and gave an appreciation for how fortunate we are today in comparison. Using this experience allowed them to discuss and balance the pros and cons of evacuation before giving their own verdict. In addition to this, they wrote a letter as an evacuee to describe their accounts of life in the countryside – good or bad. The children's classic story "Goodnight Mr Tom" has been a text focus within reading and then becoming their DEAL (Drop Everything And Listen) class book – something they have listened to avidly.




Bedtime Stories Day





BOOKMARKED STORY EVENT



Our Early Years children and Key Stage One pupils had a truly magical experience as part of the Bookmarked Story Event, a wonderful celebration of storytelling, imagination, and creativity.

Bookmarked is a mini literary festival in Thirsk, run in collaboration with White Rose BookCafé, Rural Arts, and Thirsk Community Library. As part of this event, we were fortunate to receive a storytelling workshop led by Starbright Arts, with the fantastic Elena delivering an engaging and interactive session that brought stories to life in a way that captivated our young learners.

Early Years – 'The Cow That Laid an Egg'

Our Early Years children were enthralled by a delightful reading of The Cow That Laid an Egg by Andy Cutbill, a charming story about a cow who suddenly finds herself at the center of a surprising mystery! Elena made the experience even more immersive by incorporating Makaton signing, helping to support communication, understanding, and engagement for all children.

To bring the story to life, the children took part in story singing, imaginative play, and music, using musical eggs to create sounds and rhythms that enhanced their storytelling experience. These activities not only made the session fun but also helped to develop language skills, confidence, and social interaction, as children worked together to explore the themes of the story. The session was a perfect combination of laughter, creativity, and learning, leaving the children excited to share their experience.

Key Stage One – Secret Owl Society Sensory Storytime

Meanwhile, our Key Stage One pupils took part in an exciting Secret Owl Society Sensory Storytime, inspired by Hoot Owl, Master of Disguise by Sean Taylor. This story follows the adventures of a determined (but not always successful!) owl as he tries to hunt using clever disguises.

During the session, the children had the opportunity to explore different disguises, just like Hoot Owl, and were encouraged to think creatively about how they could blend into different environments. The highlight of the session was the creation of a pizza parachute, where children designed their own pizzas with a mix of wonderful and not-so-wonderful toppings—a fun and imaginative way to engage with the story. This hands-on, sensory activity helped to develop problem-solving skills, creativity, and teamwork, all while reinforcing the key themes of the book in an engaging and memorable way.

A Celebration of Storytelling

The Bookmarked Story Event has been a truly fantastic experience, sparking a love for books, story-telling, and creative expression among our pupils. Storytelling is such a powerful way for children to develop their language skills, expand their imagination, and build confidence, and today's sessions provided the perfect opportunity to nurture these essential skills in a fun and interactive way.




