

Nursery News

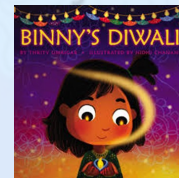
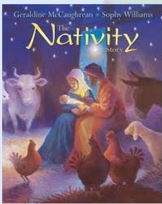
This term in Nursery, we have been settling into our routines and embracing what it means to be part of a school family. The children have been learning about belonging, sharing moments of connection, and exploring the importance of kindness and support. Through stories like *Barbara Throws a Wobbler* and *We Are a School Family*, we have been talking about our feelings—how to recognise them and ways to manage them. These discussions have helped the children feel safe and secure in their new environment, as they build relationships with their peers and adults.

The children have enjoyed exploring all areas of the Nursery, both indoors and outdoors, using play to develop their confidence and curiosity. As autumn arrived, we have been observing the changes in the season, collecting leaves, noticing the cooler weather, and discussing how our environment transforms at this time of year. These observations have sparked wonderful conversations, questions, and opportunities for creativity and imagination.

As part of our "Let's Celebrate" topic, we have been learning about different festivals and traditions, including Diwali and Christmas. The children explored the story of Diwali and its beautiful traditions, such as creating diya lamps and talking about the significance of light. As we prepare for Christmas, the excitement is growing as we share stories, sing festive songs, and talk about how different families celebrate this special time of year. These activities have helped the children to develop an appreciation of diversity, whilst fostering a sense of joy and togetherness.

Reception News

This term our theme has been 'Friends, Families and Festivals'. The first half term focused on settling in and getting to know one another well, including what it means to be part of 'Our School Family'. This half term one of our Wow Words has been 'celebration'. We kickstarted our learning with Bonfire night, with lots of talk about similarities and differences between our families in relation to if we celebrate it, and how we celebrate it. Reception then looked at Diwali and how this is celebrated. There was a lot of thought and discussion about how the celebration of Bonfire Night and Diwali are similar and different. The children then investigated Birthdays and found out about different traditions that families have for these. Finally, we have looked at the Christmas Nativity Story and have wondered what all these celebrations have in common. Reception have decided that Bonfire Night, Birthdays, Diwali and Christmas all use some type of light to help celebrate. The books that have helped Reception learn about celebrations.



Key Stage One

Writing

Year One and Two have had some very special visitors to help inspire writing this half term. To coincide with their learning about The Nativity Story, the children have learnt all about babies. This started with learning information about how to care for babies. Each child wrote a question, practising how to use a question mark, for Mrs Kirkman – who visited with her baby. The children asked their baby related question and used this information to write an information piece titled 'How to care for a baby'. The following week Miss Shepherd, whose baby is due next year, visited the children. This time the children shared their information writing, so that Miss Shepherd knew exactly how to care for a baby by the time she left! There was then some discussion about how Mary must have felt on the donkey whilst being pregnant. The children practised their question writing some more, and then got to ask Mary herself when she visited! The children used all these experiences to re-write the Nativity Story, with an added emphasis on how Mary felt and what she might have been thinking throughout the story.



Maths

Year One began the term by looking at place value, including how to sequence number and how to use a number track. This led to investigating a number line and how this can be used to support addition and subtraction. Within this the children practised using the part/part/ whole model and the bar model technique. Year One have practised automatically recalling number bonds of ten, and how to use a number line, part/part/ whole model, or bar model to show this knowledge.

Year Two have been busy counting in 2s, 3s, 5s and 10s! Children have been accessing TTRS and now have log ins in their reading records! Y2 have been using number lines, base 10 and counters to aid in their addition and subtraction! They have been working extremely hard with crossing the tens in both addition and subtraction!

Curriculum

Design Technology and Science

In Science the children have been learning about Materials. This has included naming and describing the properties of materials, as well as investigating fitness for purpose. Our older children have explored the difference between natural materials and human made materials. All of this learning in Science has supported learning in Design Technology, as children have designed, planned and made a Nativity puppet. Careful choices were made in relation to what they had learnt about Materials



Year 3- Helvellyn

What an amazing start to KS2 year 3 have had. It has been a real change for them, yet they have approached it maturely and confidently.

This term in mathematics, they have continued their times table practice and seeing how well they practice their 4,8 and 6s has been amazing. Keep it up! We have looked at place value, addition and subtraction and have just finished our unit on multiplication and division.

In our English units we have read *The Nothing To See Here Hotel* which the children were so engaged with and can confidently recall. They wrote amazing diary entries and newspaper articles discussing all the antics at the hotel. They used drama in their lesson to act out scenes from the book and this was amazing to see their creativity. They are all budding actors. Our picture book to end the term on was *Leon and the place between where we discovered the 'forgotten circus'*. The children used their knowledge of adjectives, conjunctions, and their new learning of prepositions to write a setting description of what it is like inside.

During the afternoons, we have looked at life when the Romans invaded in History. We discovered what the uniform was like for a soldier and how they successfully invaded Britain by making their own shields and practising drills. In Geography, we have been looking at volcanoes and the positives and negatives of being close to one. We have especially enjoyed our Science lessons where we have completed some experiments on melting and evaporation states of matter. We have been on a nature walk of the school grounds to discover living plants and animals nearby. We will replicate this in the spring to compare. Finally, they all thoroughly enjoyed looking at circuits in DT before making their own torches in DT. In Art they have created their own scratch art and looked at composition and patterns.

I hope they have a lovely break over Christmas and look forward to seeing them in the New year.

Year 4– Scafell

What a term we have had. The children have been working their socks off, planning, writing and publishing a range of writing genres, from a narrative regarding clothing turning into animals whilst in the washing machine (using 'something fishy' as inspiration), a newspaper report of a Pigeon causing chaos in America (using Pigeon Impossible as inspiration), a diary extract from the novel 'A Place Called Perfect' (which has had the most exciting, cliff hanging ending to a book), and setting descriptions following a morning of disruption when 'The Wolves came out of the Walls'. The children have started to use fronted adverbials, adjectives within sentences for effect, speech and the correct punctuation, and 'show don't tell' sentences where feelings are shown through actions.

In maths they have been following White Rose Maths, covering a wide range of skills from place value, to addition and subtraction, from multiplication and division to area. They are increasing the use of apparatus, mainly numicon and place value counters, in order to prove their answers.

For DEAL (Drop Everything And Listen), we have been reading the novel 'Secrets of a Sun King' which is a fictional story (with some historical facts) which takes us from London 1919 to Egypt, finding the tomb of Tutankhamun and returning his stolen heart.

Year 5 Snowdon

What a busy half term we have had!

In English, we finished reading 'Narnia'. All of the children loved this book, and we finished with the film! We also wrote some newspaper reports all about this, which the children also acted out as TV news reports. We have also read 'The Island', which inspired some fabulous writing about being washed up on a desert island. In Maths, we have been learning all about fractions. The children have persevered with this, even though it has been tricky!!

In History, year 4 and 5 have been learning about the Romans. We have looked at their invasion of Britain and how their army was formed. We looked at and demonstrated these formations as a group. In Geography, we have been looking at Mountains and Volcanoes. We have used atlases to locate different mountain ranges and discussed why they are where they are. In PSH, we have looked at Health and Well-being. We have discussed how to keep both out physical and mental health good, and what we can do to help ourselves.

Year 6—Ben Nevis

What a term it has been for Year 6. They have delved deep into the book "Holes" by Louis Sachar and produced some fantastic pieces of writing about lethal lizards, written diaries from the main Character, Stanley and described the setting of Camp Green Lake.

Most recently Year 6 turned rather Grinch-like and have created instructions on how to steal Christmas like the Grinch – hopefully not acting upon their own advice! In maths, it has all been about calculations – tackling really well the long division that can often be the nemesis of Year 6 but they did it and persevered. Alongside calculation, they have jumped straight into fractions work which is such a huge and important part of their maths curriculum – this is where they have found that knowing their multiplication and division facts are essential.

In other areas of their learning, they have been fascinated in the history of the census: finding out how they worked and what we can learn from them today.

In geography, they have focused on populations both nationally and internationally – finding out what impacts changes to populations.

Year 6 have shown themselves to be budding artists- particularly as street artists as they practised tag letters and a range of printing to create Christmas themed street art.

Within Science, they have studied how to classify living things using classification keys and then revisited Electricity which led to an investigation into the impact of increasing voltage on components such as buzzers. To keep them on their toes, the class have practised and improved upon their balancing skills – which looked easy at the beginning but many realised the level of control needed was more than first thought!

Overall, Year 6 have had plenty to get their teeth into this term and are all clearly ready for a rest and recharge! Well done Year 6!

Wraparound Care News

This term we have been delighted to welcome new faces to both Breakfast and After School Club as well as our existing pupils. It has been great to catch up with what everyone has done over the Summer term.

We had a few changes this term with the main one being a change to staffing within Breakfast Club. Mrs Cooke has reduced her working hours and is in Breakfast Club Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday and then Mrs Almond is in Thursday and Friday, Mrs Mountford continues to be in both clubs full time.

We are also very lucky that the hut is now a fully dedicated Wraparound Care hut. The other room we are tidying and are going to use for creative play where the pupils can leave a scenario out and it can stay up for a few days and as a quiet area for those that need a few minutes. This room will be only used for After School Club unless we feel a pupil may need it on a morning.

We have been making the most of the light nights (September – October half term) by going outside either onto the field or onto the trim trail within the playground. Pupils have included everyone into their games which include football, throwing & catching ball skills, use of chalk to draw on the path, playing tig, hide and seek and use of their imagination for games on the trim trail Inc the floor is lava! (this was a popular choice with us all).

We have also listened and introduced longer hours to help with work patters. Our Breakfast Club is now open from 7.30am and After School Club closes at 6pm. We have noticed a slight increase in numbers now that the hours have increased and still have spaces available for both clubs.

Since returning from half term in November, we have been looking at our working displays and have focused on Autumn and more recently our Christmas ones. Pupils have participated in various arts and crafts to help us, which they have loved especially the paints and glitters.

Mrs Almond found a template to make our own flextangles and kindly made one up and showed us all how to make them, these were very popular as you can imagine and it was great to see the pupil's colour, make up and play with these.

We decorated the hut for Christmas and we would like to thank Florence and Rory for offering to decorate our Christmas tree. You did a fab job and thank you!

In recent weeks, we have had Sparkles our WAC Elf as a daily visitor, Sparkles has been up to some mischievous things and the pupils have loved seeing what mischief he has been causing. We will see what he gets up to this week, nowhere is safe!

The pupils have got really engaged with our Christmas display, made up of small templates put together like a jigsaw puzzle to make a bigger picture. This was another one of Mrs Almond's amazing finds which meant everyone was able to contribute to our tree display, thank you Mrs Almond this looks great on the wall.

Last year, 42% of children in North Yorkshire left primary school unable to read at the expected level for their age. Whilst researchers suppose reasons as to why this is the case, for example an increase in screen related activities, the remedy is simple.

The BIGGEST influencer in relation to reading ability is

READING FOR PLEASURE 😊 We need children who love books and reading, who are excited to choose a book, to listen to it being read, or to read it to themselves. A bedtime story is the perfect anchor for this, no matter the age of the child or stage of development. In this way, being read TO, is MORE important than learning to read!!



A bedtime story has the potential to have a lasting effect on lives. It is never too late to start this, or too late to stop. If listening to a reader is fun, special, and consistent- the research shows it increases academic ability and overall lifetime happiness!

We are currently looking for volunteers to 'read aloud' to our pupils in our book and story areas. This is in no way a lesson or formal teaching! This is simply for fun and for the love of reading. Volunteers would simply invite a child or children to choose a book they would like to listen to, and read it to them. No pressure, no formality, just inspiring children to read. Another great performance from our year 5/6 Quicksticks hockey team, who also put on quite a show. Energetic spirit and teamwork is what it was all about!

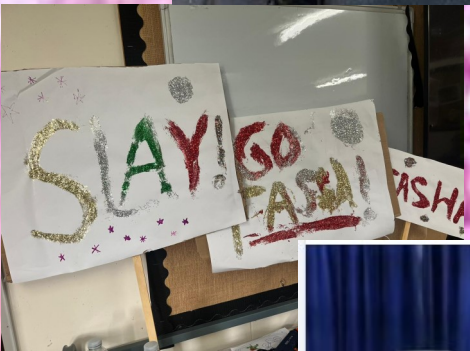
